Serving Families in Need for Christ —"In Good Times & In Bad"

People often say, "My Brother's Keeper must be getting more requests than ever in this economy!" Yes, we absolutely are but, unfortunately, there's always a waiting list for our services—in good times and in bad.

Why? Because no other charity on the South Shore delivers furniture and groceries free of charge as core programs and fewer charities than ever offer Christmas assistance.

One of the biggest changes we have seen is more calls for help from the places where we usually pick up donations.

You and I may not realize it as we go about our daily lives but those who are in need... those who are hurting and in despair... are often right around us, living in our own towns and neighborhoods.

Here's an example from our ministry's hometown, a request from an **Easton** mom for Christmas help:

"I've heard about your Christmas program and was wondering how I go about getting my kids on the list for this year. I lost my job and I don't know how I'm ever going to be able to give them a Christmas."

Our Christmas program is just beginning but we've already received more than **1,000** requests like this from parents in **47** different communities, including towns you might not expect like **Braintree**, **Bridgewater**, **Mansfield**, **Milton**, **Norwood**, **Scituate**, and **Walpole**.

As you can see, today's need in our local community is not just deeper: it's wider too.

As Christians, we should recognize that increased need gives us an increased opportunity: the opportunity to live out the **Gospel** in ever-greater ways... to bring more people closer to **Christ** by serving them with dignity, love, and respect in their time of need. What a tremendous privilege which **God** affords us!

Last Christmas, *My Brother's Keeper* served **2,262** families—**9,175** children and adults—living in **59** communities from towns as far north as **Peabody** down to **Fall River** and the **Cape**. With your help, we will serve even more families this year.

Serving Those Who Served Our Country

It was **Mike's** first time calling *My Brother's Keeper* and he seemed a little nervous. Although we serve without prerequisites, people who call our Helpline often feel the need to explain their situation and tell us why they need help. **Mike**, 33 years old, offered, "*I'm a veteran. I heard about your food program from a friend at the VA Hospital.*" When I thanked him for his service, **Mike** said it was "a pleasure and an honor."

After taking down his address and phone number, I told him we'd send a food delivery that afternoon between 3-5 p.m. Each year, *My Brother's Keeper* makes **3,500** food deliveries like this one. All of them are delivered the same day food is requested, within just a couple of hours of the call! Our staff member **John DeAngelo** loaded up the van with **Stonehill** students **Andrew Quinn, Ryan Diamond, Sean Kennedy,** and **Garrett Alofs** and hit the road to deliver to **Mike** and many others in need.

At 5:15 pm, my phone rang again. It was after hours but I recognized **Mike's** number on the caller ID so I answered it right away. **Mike** said, "I just wanted to thank you guys. The staff and volunteers that just visited me were wonderful. I knew you'd send canned goods but I wasn't expecting to get things like milk, eggs, vegetables, and meat. I was totally out of food so I really appreciate it."

"You're very welcome, **Mike**," I told him. "Feel free to call us again if you need more help." Without hesitation, **Mike** asked "When I get back on my feet, is there anything I can do for you—donate time or food or money?"

With **Veterans Day** approaching, we pause to remember and appreciate the tremendous contribution our men and women of the armed forces have given to us and our country. **Mike** is just one example of these many selfless individuals with a heart of service. It's our privilege and honor to serve them.

"True Christian Service"

This summer at *My Brother's Keeper* was the best summer of my life. I found the answer to my question, "What is true Christian service?"

On my last day, we delivered to **William**, a man living in a one-room apartment who had just been released from the hospital. When **William** called on the phone to ask for help, he was gruff and concerned about the quality of the furniture. "Did it come from a dumpster?" he asked. He obviously didn't know our mission.

The furniture we brought **William** was some of the nicest I'd delivered all summer. The coffee and end tables were a matching set without a scratch on them. The small kitchen table fit perfectly in his tiny apartment and he loved the beautiful black leather couch.

After the delivery, **William** was close to tears, a sharp change from his curt demeanor on the phone. I handed him the crucifix before we left and said, "This is the man who sent you the furniture." **William** looked closely at it and said, "I used to be a Christian." We told him, "No matter how difficult the circumstances are, **God** is always there for you."

Upon hearing this, **William's** barriers came crashing down—he opened up and shared with us the past tragedies of his life. He was very bitter about the things he'd endured and I got the feeling we were one of the first he'd ever told this.

We must have spent twenty minutes listening to **William's** story. When he finished, he stopped, looked at the crucifix, and admitted, "Maybe **God** does have a plan for everything." He began to speak of **God** as a friend and, again, I had the impression this was the first time he'd done that in years. As we left, **William** told us, "If you're ever in the area again, stop in to see me and have a soda."

The change in **William's** demeanor was striking. He was transformed from a bitter man who said "God hates me" to a man who had **Hope**. It was **God** working through everyone at My Brother's Keeper... from the staff member answering the phone... to the volunteers who picked up the beautiful furniture... to those of us who had the privilege to make the delivery. Every person did their part, just as if they were serving **Christ** himself. This is true Christian service and its power to change lives.
