"Amongst the Dry Bones, You Have Brought Me to Life!"

The four of us, Dave, our newest staff member, a mother, Lori, and her teenage daughter, Jillian, and I were sitting in the delivery truck at My Brothers Keeper in Dartmouth.

Although Jillian had been on a delivery previously, it was Lori's first time and she was quite excited. As I was about to put the truck in gear,

Lori spoke up from the back seat: "Would it be alright if I said a little prayer before we start off?"

I told her that would be great!

Lori asked God to give us open hearts and minds and help us to be instruments of His love with the people we served that day. After an "Amen," we were on our way to Fall River to deliver furniture to Sherry, a young mother coming out of a homeless shelter with her one year old daughter, Angel.

Arriving, we saw that Sherry's apartment was empty except for a couch and a crib in Angel's room. But, from the moment we arrived, Sherry continued to tell us how grateful she was to God for all that He had done for her.

As her beautiful little girl tottered around after us, Sherry said, "I was on the street when I was carrying Angel, but even then I knew God was with me. Finally, I managed to get into a shelter. After I had Angel, I was in a halfway house. This is my first apartment. God has carried me through it all." Dave and I brought in a long dresser and after attaching the mirror we carried in the full bed, night stand and lamp. Lori and Jillian followed with the kitchen set and a television for the living room. Amazed at what had been provided, Sherry could not stop marveling at the quality of the furniture and praising God for His goodness.

Suddenly she said, "Can we stop for just a minute? I'm so filled up right now I'd like to sing you a song I made up. It's a song I wrote for God, to tell Him how much I appreciate all He's done for me."

We stood quietly, the four of us, as Sherry sang in a clear, soft voice:

"Jesus I'm grateful for all you have done. Your many blessings make me shine like the sun. Amongst the dry bones, you have brought me to life. Jesus I'm thankful for your sacrifice."

Following her song, we gave Sherry the crucifix with our message that "He is the one who sent you the furniture."

She simply smiled and held it to her breast.

Time and again, in the twenty-six years since God started My Brothers Keeper, I have set out on a delivery to fulfill our mission: "To Bring the Love and Hope of Jesus Christ to those we serve."

And, time and again, I have discovered that Jesus was already there before we arrived.





Jack Shaughnessy Ever Faithful to Christ and My Brother's Keeper

Before his passing in November 2013, Jack Shaughnessy of Milton was one of our ministry's greatest friends and

most devoted supporters. He remained ever faithful to Christ and My Brother's Keeper through his last, most generous gift which came this summer—our first major bequest and the largest single donation ever given to My Brother's Keeper.

"It is with great pride and great humility that we accept Jack's legacy gift," said Jim and Terry Orcutt, co-founders of My Brother's Keeper. "With great pride that our dear friend believed so deeply in our work for Christ and families in need. With great humility because Jack's generous gift requires the strongest

stewardship on our part—our best efforts to use his donation in ways he would support."

Jack notified My Brother's Keeper of his intended gift which gave our Board of Directors the opportunity to give clear, thoughtful direction on the best use of unrestricted major gifts like his.

"After months of careful planning, our Board of Directors enacted a cash management policy to ensure Jack's gift and others like it in the future will be used effectively to do the most good," said Erich Miller, president of My Brother's Keeper.



"It's important to note our board affirmed our commitment NOT to have any kind of endowment.

We decided, first and most importantly, that major gifts will help us serve local families in need in Christ's name now. Second, major gifts will help make My Brother's Keeper stronger in the long-run by helping us create a 3-month operating reserve, fund special projects to advance our mission and meet our future capital needs. This would be especially important to Jack since he was chair of our Capital Campaign Committee when the Easton facility was built."

In keeping with Matthew 6:3—"Do not let your left hand know what your right hand is

doing"—Jack always preferred to keep his charitable giving private with one exception: when he believed his leadership could inspire others.

Jack deeply loved the mission of My Brother's Keeper and one of his hopes in making this gift is that it would encourage others to remember My Brother's Keeper in their will. The day's 'mission moment' was provided by Owen Leary, a recent graduate of Bishop Stang High School who talked about his life-changing experiences volunteering at our Dartmouth facility. He noted that Christ can be discovered in each individual we encounter: *"we are truly working alongside God on each delivery we make; as we tell each person to whom we hand a crucifix, we really are doing His work. Christ is the reason we must do service, He is the means of carrying it out, and most of all He is the face which we may observe at every point along the way."* Beautiful words from a student who knew nothing about My Brother's Keeper one year ago!

Just the Delivery Guy By Mr. Timothy Weed, C.S.C.



One of the most remarkable things about the ministry of My Brother's Keeper isn't the massive amount of furniture or food that they deliver to people

in need. It isn't the warm hospitality of the staff and volunteers. Nor is it the enormous amount of hard work that goes into each and every delivery.

No, it is the faith-filled conviction to their mission of spreading the love and hope of Jesus Christ to those they serve. Each and every furniture delivery ends with a gift: a crucifix. The Man on the Cross is the one who gave the furniture. It is a powerful moment of faith and hope that can leave the recipient stunned or quiet, joyful or tearful. It is truly a remarkable faith experience.

The Keeper wants to serve anyone and everyone that they can without judgments. There are no forms, no standards to qualify, no need too great or too small for the Keeper to offer its services. The gift of the Crucifix symbolizes that self-gift and selfemptying that must take place in each member of the team. It also reminds me that this is the standard to which each Christian is challenged to meet. The ultimate moment of gift and sacrifice was the moment when Jesus Christ was nailed to the Cross to assume the heavy burden of the world's sins.

Whether the person receiving the Crucifix understands the significance or not, it has a powerful effect on the members of the delivery staff. Each one of us is reminded that it is not about us or what we do. Instead our actions and words should lead others to Jesus Christ. We need to bring that hope and love to a world that sorely needs it.

When you walk into an apartment on the third floor of a building in downtown Fall River or Brockton and see that it is empty of the most basic furnishings and amenities, you realize just how frivolous our own complaints can seem. Yet these people that seem to have nothing often have the greatest faith because in some cases that is all they have. There is nothing else but their faithful belief that God will hear their cry for help and answer their prayers.

We are instruments of Christ in the world. We are the Body of Christ, and we must be the ones who are willing to conform ourselves to His way of life. We must be prepared to take up the Cross that is offered to us, and we must be willing to help lighten the Crosses of others.

We often complain that the world is such a dark place filled with violence and destruction, but the worst thing that we can do is sit idly by and watch it happen. If there is no action taken, then Christ cannot heal the world.

When we offer the Crucifix to someone on a delivery we are reminding both them and ourselves that it is Christ who provides for the world. We are only His instruments, His tools in helping reconcile God to man.

Christ is the answer to the prayers of the poor, and we need to be just the delivery people.
