My Brother's Keeper started accepting Christmas requests in mid-September and we've already promised our help to 1,500 families. We expect this number to grow to 2,700 families in the coming weeks—more than 10,000 children and parents!

So who are the families who reach out to My Brother's Keeper for help? What are their lives like?

Their stories are as different as there are people: parents and grandparents... working, disabled and unemployed... families living in Boston, the North Shore, the South Shore, Fall River and the Cape... good people from all over eastern Massachusetts.

Despite their differences, they all have one thing in common: they're hurting and they're doing the best they can to provide for the people they love.

Here's one letter we received from a struggling mom in Taunton:

Hi my name is Therese and I can use any help that's available with furniture, Christmas and other expenses.

My son Jason and I experienced an emotional and financial hardship a few months ago when we lost everything because of bed bugs. I used up all my savings finding a new place after going from home to home of family members.

Jason also has asthma and I struggle to pay for his inhalers. I don't have any money to get his refills at this time and I don't know when I will.

The problem is I work so I don't qualify for help from most places. I'm a single mom doing it all on my own. I have tons of problems but many blessings too so I figured I'd just try to see if you can help. I'd also like to say thank you for all you do for our community and your work for the Lord.



As a staff member at My Brother's Keeper, I have the tremendous privilege of delivering God's love and hope to families in need every day. Amidst our busy schedule, it can be easy to lose sight of this blessing, though, even for our staff. One recent delivery in Fall River's Flint neighborhood put this privilege into sharp focus.



As I climbed the narrow, winding stairs up to the second floor, I found myself consumed with calculating distances and angles in my head. *Would a full-size box spring really fit up these stairs? How about the couch and the long dresser?* But at the top of the stairs, the calculations stopped. The apartment was empty, if you could even call it an apartment.

We were here to deliver a bedroom set to Andrea, Mark, and their 2 ½ month old daughter, Jasmine. This was the family's first apartment after spending the pregnancy and past few months sleeping on a pullout couch in Mark's parent's home. And if this hadn't been hard enough, Andrea suffered from frequent epileptic attacks.

Andrea was so excited to finally have her own place that she didn't seem to notice the missing floorboards and exposed drywall in this shell of an apartment. Fortunately, Mark and a friend were hard at work and had already finished putting new hardwood flooring in the family's bedroom.

The renovations and deposit for the apartment had exhausted the couple's little savings so their only piece of furniture was an old range sitting in the middle of the living room. *"I've looked everywhere for a bed,"* Andrea explained as she gently rocked little Jasmine. *"I went from church to church but they don't have furniture and I couldn't get any help until I found My Brother's Keeper."*

Time to move the furniture in... the box spring and the rest of the bedroom set fit up the stairs without a problem. *"It's beautiful!"* she screamed as we set up the bed. *"I've never owned anything so big!"* But upon receiving the crucifix, Andrea became quiet. *"I'll hang this above Jasmine's crib," she whispered.*

On my way down that same set of stairs, I remembered why I had come to Fall River today. No longer thinking about moving furniture or the day's logistics, I remembered the great privilege of serving in Christ's name.



UPDATES ON OUR FALL RIVER EXPANSION

In every endeavor, our leadership asks the question, "Are we following God's will?" It's a difficult question... how can we know with certainty?

The late Father Richard Sullivan CSC, a founding board member, gave us wise yet practical advice: "If you're prayerfully working towards a goal and things move forward relatively smoothly, you can be confident your actions are in keeping with God's will. If you're constantly running into roadblocks, though, God may be trying to tell you something."

We are happy to say our efforts to expand to Fall River have gone very smoothly so we feel affirmed that God is indeed calling us to shine our light brighter and in new places. Here are some updates on our progress:

- We've made 40 furniture deliveries in 2012 to families in need in Fall River
- Families' reaction to the crucifix and the quality of our service has been overwhelming
- We've gotten great feedback from caseworkers at Citizens for Citizens, the Fall River nonprofit referring people in need to us
- We had very positive introductory meetings with Mayor William Flanagan of Fall River and Superintendent Meg Mayo-Brown, head of Fall River Public Schools
- Our own volunteers and supporters have been extremely encouraging... one example: we recently received a \$10,000 gift from a generous donor designated for our Fall River expansion
- We've received project funding from The Yawkey Foundation and our request is currently under consideration by two other major foundations
- The director of one prominent Massachusetts foundation reviewed our Fall River business plan and described it as "thoughtful, smart and clear!!! The BEST plan I have seen in a long time."

"WHERE DO YOU GET FURNITURE?"

One of the most common questions we hear at My Brother's Keeper is "Where do you get your furniture?"

Our furniture donations mostly come from residences our regular pickup area includes 35 South Shore towns! —but My Brother's Keeper is blessed with tremendous commercial and educational partners too.

Over the summer, Tufts University donated 550 twin mattresses and 300 dressers, all in excellent condition, as they refurnished dorms. Other educational partners include Stonehill College, Boston College and Providence College.

We recently received two other significant in-kind corporate donations. First, Keith Construction of Canton and Superior Plumbing in Dedham met one of our most urgent needs by donating 150 refrigerators from renovated apartment complexes in Beverly and Maynard.

The refrigerators are perfect for our use: they're apartment-sized to easily navigate tight stairways and reliable and energy-efficient at just 6-8 years old.

Faxon Woods, a residential community in Quincy, is responsible for our second generous donation, high-quality kitchen and living room furniture from the property's common areas: 7 couches, 25 upholstered chairs, 9 kitchen sets, 4 dressers plus coffee tables and end tables.

These large influxes of furniture are especially helpful because they allow us to quickly serve more families in need. With the help of commercial donations like these, My Brother's Keeper has made a record 1,100 furniture deliveries over the last 12 months.

Our special thanks to Tufts University, Keith Construction, Superior Plumbing, Faxon Woods and countless other commercial and educational partners who support our work so generously!

We've gotten many compliments over the year and traffic at **www.MyBrothersKeeper.org** has been strong: 35,000 unique visitors in the past 12 months, 70% of whom are first-time visitors.

We are especially pleased that two pages of the website have been well-utilized: our Furniture Donation and Prayer Request forms.

The Furniture Donation form allows online visitors to not only offer furniture but also upload pictures along with a 'pick-up deadline,' the date by which the furniture must be removed.

We received 600 furniture donation forms over the past year and we believe this user-friendly tool will be especially helpful when we open a Fall River facility and expand furniture pickups to the South Coast.

As a Christian ministry, we are heartened when people reach out to My Brother's Keeper for prayers in their time of need. Since the website launched, 150 Prayer Request forms have been entrusted to us by those we serve as well as our supporters.

Here's one heart-breaking intention we recently received:

Request: Please pray for my children & me. I am a single mother of 5. A year & a half ago I lost my job & our home is in foreclosure! I don't know how I am going to make Christmas happen this year or where we will live. I pray everyday for our health & that I am able to provide as much as I can for my children.

Grace is a 65 year old grandmother with custody of her three grandkids ranging from 7 to 11 years old. "This is the first time I've ever asked for help," she told me. I'm on a fixed income, though, and making ends meet has become harder and harder with three new mouths to feed."

She began to cry and said, *"I never expected to be in this position at this point in my life. I can't imagine not being able to give my grandkids a Christmas."*

Grace was so grateful and I explained, as I always do, "It's our privilege to serve you. May God bless you and your family."

As I ended the call, I was moved to tears as well reflecting on the beauty of the My Brother's Keeper Christmas Program: we will deliver toys, clothes and joy to the children and 'the Love and Hope of Christ' to a special Grandmother.

But this little white dog, covered in oil, followed him home one day. He couldn't help but take her in, even though he was still thinking about his last dog. You could see by the dog toys that Chris had grown attached to the new puppy but he wanted his brother to have her. Together, they decided to name her 'Angel.' It was so, so heartwarming: one twin was sacrificing for the other...in order to give him 'love.' Chris was truly his brother's keeper.

After we delivered the food to both apartments, Matt insisted that we say a prayer with their family before we left. We all stood around their living room, held hands, and Matt started the prayer. He recited a wonderful, wonderful poem that he had written about Jesus sacrificing His blood for us. It was an incredible poem which brought tears to my eyes and we ended with an Our Father.

It was my first experience volunteering at My Brother's Keeper where I was a part of something so overtly, devoutly and eagerly spiritual while on deliveries. Matt's prayer showed me how much light My Brother's Keeper does indeed shine 'out there' and how *strongly* that light shines.

God's nest is constantly, constantly growing with all His many birds adding their "little by little" every day.
