No Coincidence

On September 17, 2014, Josh Smith, Dave O'Connor, Cindy Arnold-Vajgrt and I went on a furniture delivery to a woman named Cheryl who lived in Fall River. We weren't planning on making deliveries that day but this was an emergency— she had lost everything in a fire.

When we arrived at the apartment, we introduced ourselves and Cheryl told us the when, where and how of her fire.

After a little more conversation, we began carrying her furniture in. It was a 4th floor

apartment... the most stairs on any delivery I'd been on!

When I came up with a load of pots and pans, I told her, "I know what you're going through, Cheryl. On December 16th, 2000, I lost everything in a fire too."



She asked about the location of my fire and when I told her, "381 4th Street in Fall River," she said, "Oh, my God! My brother was in that fire too!" I asked his name and Sandra said, "Anthony." Anthony had lived on the 3rd floor right above me.

I looked at Cheryl totally amazed and said, "If it wasn't for your brother, I would not be standing in your apartment right now. Your brother saved my life. He got me out of that fire. I've searched for 14 years to say thank you to him. Now I have my chance."

The more we talked, the more we realized how small life really is. It turns out Cheryl and I grew up in the same town, Somerset, and we went to the same high school.

There's an old Portuguese saying: "God writes straight with crooked lines." I have a

much better understanding of what that means now. God's plan is so much bigger than our own and there are no coincidences. I was meant to be on that delivery on September 17th, 2014.

A Mother's Love: Made in the Image and Likeness of God

Joe Palladino (Stonehill) and Nick Bianchini (Oliver Ames / Easton) joined me on a couple of furniture deliveries in Brockton on a recent Friday afternoon. We drove through some pretty tough neighborhoods to get to our first stop, a modest but nice single-family home on a quiet street. The contrast between the neighborhoods was striking.

As we approached Thomasina's front door, we weren't too encouraged to see the lights off in the house and no car in the driveway. Sure enough, no one was home when we knocked so we moved onto to our second delivery. It was only about a mile away—3 beds for a mother, son and grandson named Tasha, Perry and Alex. It was a joy to meet their family because they clearly shared a great love for one another.

When that delivery was done, we took one more shot at reaching Thomasina. She was home! When we pulled up in front of the house a second time, there was a Lexus in the driveway. It would have been easy to make a judgment that she didn't really need our help but, as a matter of policy, My Brother's Keeper serves without prerequisites. Our work for the Lord is to serve— not to judge.

We knocked on the door and Thomasina opened it up...about 50 years old...a nice woman but quiet and subdued. She showed us around her home and told us about her family: 5 boys ranging from 14 years old to 25. We were delivering a crib and a dresser to the oldest son who recently had his first child and moved back in with his parents.

After we moved in the furniture, Nick did a wonderful job presenting Thomasina with the crucifix and BOOM!!!... at the sight of Christ, this reserved mother broke down into tears, hugged Nick, and shared how difficult things really were.

Her oldest son had been on the path to success...a good student in college...before drugs and alcohol took over his life. He left school, was hanging out with the wrong crowd, had been in a number of car accidents and was clearly headed down the wrong path. In a fit of rage one night, he even destroyed all the family's furniture in their basement. His life was out of control and Thomasina knew she was powerless to stop him.

It broke Thomasina's heart to see her son make such poor decisions but it didn't change her love for him. Her love remained constant, unbroken, unconditional. It was profound to witness this love.

On the way back to My Brother's Keeper, Joe, Nick and I talked about a mother's love for her child...how it may be the clearest example of what it means to be made in the image and likeness of God. It certainly gives us good insight as to how we should love as ministry...what it really means to be our brother's and sister's keeper.

Sharing Our Story—2014 National Furniture Bank Conference

In September, we represented My Brother's Keeper at the 2014 Furniture Bank Conference in Tacoma, WA.

About 50 staff and volunteers from furniture banks across the US and Canada attended as well as representatives from furniture manufacturers and the North American Home Furnishing Association.

Two days of seminars covered topics as diverse as assembling furniture to partnering with furniture retailers to effectively using social media. We were also given time to network with the other attendees and tour the conference host's facility, Tacoma's NW Furniture Bank.

In addition to being participants, we had the honor of presenting on Volunteer Management best practices to our peers. After all, with over 3,000 amazing volunteers walking through the doors of My Brother's Keeper each year, our model of service is markedly different from most other furniture resources.

Our talk focused on the intentionality with which My Brother's Keeper seeks to build Christian community and our special focus on engaging student volunteers.

A participant from Missouri was particularly struck that our young volunteers are tremendous assets to My Brother's Keeper in the present and are poised to become our ministry's leaders in the future. We shared a powerful student reflection and he told us afterwards, "It was like hearing God's voice telling me which direction our organization needs to go."

We learned so much which will strengthen the work of My Brother's Keeper but the opportunity to inspire God's helpers at other furniture resources, considered alone, made the cross-country trip worthwhile.

Did you know there's a national furniture bank association?

A furniture bank is commonly defined as a 501(c)(3) nonprofit whose work is to provide free furniture to families struggling with poverty and other severe life challenges. There are about 80 furniture banks in the US and Canada.

The Furniture Bank Association of North America was founded in 2001 to encourage furniture banks to share best practices, to facilitate national publicity of the furniture bank concept and to act as a clearinghouse to facilitate major furniture donations from hotels & motels, colleges & universities, furniture retailers and manufacturers.


