Hello, my name is Alicia. I am a single mother of two children, my daughter age 13 and my son age 3. For the last II years I've been homeless and the holidays have always been tough. It's really difficult celebrating Christmas with us living from place to place and me not working.

This past year, I was selected for a voucher program that helps you obtain housing. This will be our first Christmas having a home. I heard about your organization and all the great work that you do. I would absolutely appreciate any assistance My Brother's Keeper can give to me and my family during this holiday season.

This note from Alicia is a poignant request we received this year for Christmas help. Homeless for 11 years! The pandemic has been tough on everyone the past year and a half but Alicia's words are a reminder that some people experience what seems like a lifetime of pain and hardship.

Every Christmas, My Brother's Keeper is contacted by thousands of parents like Alicia. Each struggles in their own way but there's always one thing in common: tremendous stress. Parents carry a heavy weight on their shoulders trying to provide for their beloved kids.

That's why our mission "To bring the Love and Hope of Jesus Christ to those we serve" is so important. Parents need help but they also need to be reminded that God loves them and that He hears their prayers.

This is our great privilege each Christmas: the opportunity to be our brother's and sister's keeper, remove their stress and anxiety, and replace it with joy, peace, and love in Christ's name. This is the true spirit of Christmas — loving one another as a sign of our love for Jesus.

My Brother's Keeper plans to serve more than 3,000 struggling families this Christmas living throughout eastern Massachusetts - 13,000 children and parents! To join us in this important effort, please return the enclosed cards for our Adopt-A-Family Gift Program and Loaves & Fishes Food Program.

Students Are Back!

A group of 8 students from the University of Notre Dame traveled to Massachusetts from South Bend, Indiana, to serve at My Brother's Keeper during their fall break.

The students were participating in a seminar called "Spirituality of Justice" which explores how Catholic Social Teaching calls us to engage in the work of justice.

The students slept at our Dartmouth facility, served together, prayed together, cooked meals for one another, and reflected on their experiences each night.

During a particularly busy day not too long ago, I walked into one of our offices and stood completely still before asking myself, "Why did I come in here?"

While I desperately try to reassure myself that I am far too young for moments like this to become a pattern in my life, asking this question can actually be a good thing in the grand scheme of things. When we stop asking ourselves "Why am I here?" and instead ask this question of God, it can serve as a basis for reflection and even a call to action, something I had the privilege of seeing just a few weeks ago.

We were blessed to host a group of eight students from the University of Notre Dame for a week long service retreat as part of a class they are participating in. Coming to My Brother's Keeper was not actually their original planning destination but that's life in the time of COVID. Nevertheless, the students embraced our work without skipping a beat, bonding with volunteers and recipients alike, and taking on whatever the week held in store for them.

That week we met a woman named Jordan. She and her four children had just lost everything in a fire and were starting over from scratch. Fortunately, she was able to get in touch with us for Christmas. When the generous benefactor who was assigned as her take-home sponsor learned about Jordan's situation, they immediately sent nine overstuffed boxes of brand new clothing and household goods to make sure Jordan and her family could start to rebuild their lives right away. Two of the ND students, Tara and Madison, along with myself and Jenica, a regular weekday volunteer, were the fortunate crew who brought the boxes to Jordan. With each box that came off our van, her words of gratitude failed and her tears of joy took over. Jordan may have been overwhelmed with the recent events of her life, but in that moment she was overcome with hope.

On that delivery, the Notre Dame students received their answer to the question, "Why am I here?": to be Christ's hands when Jordan needed them the most.

They may not have been able to serve where and how they expected at the start of their semester, but they were certainly brought to the place where they were needed the most. Without them, Jordan would not have felt the Love and Hope of Christ in such a special and powerful way, and so many other families would still be anxiously awaiting the delivery of their furniture.

Their example will always remind me to turn my own questions into prayers whenever possible, and to always open my heart and mind to God. "Why am I here, Lord? What purpose may I serve here? Open my eyes that I may see your plan; guide my hands that I may best serve Your Will in this moment and in all moments."

Erich Miller Receives Honorary Degree from Providence College



On Sunday, October 3, Providence College awarded Erich Miller an honorary degree, a Doctorate in Public Service, as part of the Class of 2020 Commencement.

"It's a tremendous honor to be recognized by Providence College, a truly special school with a distinctive mission as a Catholic and Dominican college. I was privileged to receive the degree but I really see this as an award for My Brother's Keeper," said Erich. "PC students make a huge impact at our Dartmouth facility so it is a strong affirmation of our partnership and the good work we're doing together in Christ's name."

Since My Brother's Keeper began working on the South Coast, Providence College has been one of our most important educational partners. More than 400 PC students have served at our Dartmouth facility, with students often helping out five days per week during the academic year. Providence College also fully funded summer internships at My Brother's Keeper for three consecutive years through their Veritas Distinguished Scholars Program, very unusual for such a highly competitive program.

The Providence College Class of 2020 Commencement was originally scheduled for May 2020 but had to be postponed twice because of the pandemic. In the end, graduation was celebrated before more than 2,000 parents, faculty, staff, and administrators in Peterson Recreation Center on Providence College's campus.

Dr. Mae C. Jemison, M.D. was the keynote speaker and received an honorary doctor of humanities degree. In 1992, she served as a science mission specialist aboard the USS Endeavor and became the first woman of color to travel into space.

Honorary degrees were also awarded to Val Ackerman, commissioner of the Big East Conference; Sister Jane Gerety, R.S.M., former president of Salve Regina University; Dr. Hugh F. Lena III, Providence College's first provost and senior vice president for academic affairs.

Two honorary degrees were awarded posthumously to J. Peter Benzie, an emeritus trustee of the college and a financial services senior executive and Dr. Francis Patrick MacKay, a chemistry professor and co-founder of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Scholarship Program.



About Ignatian Volunteer Corps

New England Ignatian Volunteers are mature men and women seeking to share their time and talents in service to their community, and open to participation in a year-long spiritual development program, including prayer and reflection in the Jesuit tradition.

Ignatian Volunteers commit to one to two days per week of service in a parish, school or non-profit working directly with people experiencing poverty or marginalization or in the pursuit of social justice. The service commitment takes place over a ten-month period.

During the period of service, the volunteer engages in spiritual reflection and journaling with the assistance of a "reflector" whom he or she meets monthly. All volunteers take part in two days of reflection, one overnight retreat, and monthly meetings of the entire group of volunteers. Volunteers share their reflection and service experiences in these gatherings and together probe their deeper meaning.

Each year the Ignatian Volunteer Corps selects a book for monthly reflection and discussion. Themes have alternated among the topics of Ignatian Spirituality, Catholic Social Teaching, and Contemporary Theology.
